"Shepherdstown Remembers Antietam" to be shown on September 17 Local history groups co-sponsor event to mark 161st anniversary of the Battle of Antietam

The bloodiest day in American military history took place on September 17, 1862 in Maryland just across the river from Shepherdstown, West Virginia.

To mark the Battle of Antietam's anniversary, on Sunday, September 17 at 3:00 pm, the Shepherdstown Opera House will host the first theater screening of "Shepherdstown Remembers Antietam," an original film written and produced by local history researcher Jim Surkamp. The film describes the Battle's impact through the eyes of Shepherdstown-area residents of the time, many of whom mobilized to aid wounded and hungry soldiers. A short Q&A will follow the film. Admission will be free.

For 30-plus years, Surkamp has collected and organized photographs and written recollections from local figures such as Mary Bedinger Mitchell, Nettie Lee, and Henry L. Snyder. His dedication to local history earned him Historic Shepherdstown's 2023 *Preserving Historic Legacies* Award.

This showing of *Shepherdstown Remembers Antietam* is co-sponsored by three Shepherdstown-based non-profit organizations devoted to historic preservation, research and education:

- Historic Shepherdstown & Museum
- Shepherdstown Battlefield Preservation Association
- Shepherd University's George Tyler Moore Center for the Study of the Civil War

Immediately before the film's screening, Surkamp will lead a walking tour, starting at the Entler Hotel and ending at the Opera House, for invited guests of the co-sponsoring organizations.

"How many towns have their own historian-filmmaker?" remarked Harriet Pearson, co-owner of the Shepherdstown Opera House. "We're pleased that the renovated Opera House can showcase Jim Surkamp's work with the co-sponsorship of Historic Shepherdstown & Museum, the George Tyler Moore Center at Shepherd University, and the Shepherdstown Battlefield Preservation Association."
